

University teaching should place “education through research” (“Bildung durch Wissenschaft” or “lernendes Forschen”) into its center place. The didactical-methodical concept of a course should rest on the basic principle of conveying discipline-specific reflective and context knowledge to enable students to acquire and apply the essential tools and techniques of academic working. It is important that students sharpen their own, independent power of judgment, become acquainted with reflected and critical thinking on the basis of rational criteria, and, in such a way, can develop and communicate arguments convincingly. University teaching, moreover, should be outward-looking, i.e., international and European and interdisciplinary in nature. In the area of law, students are to be prepared for a consistently increasing complexity of legal questions caused by different regulatory layers penetrating each other, i.e., local, domestic, European, and international ones. This interdependence should not only be reflected in the course content, it is a matter of course that teaching is also conducted in the English language, and foreign guest speakers are invited to class on a regular basis. Courses may also be organized together with a foreign higher education institution. Furthermore, law can only be fully understood and meaningfully be applied if its analysis is embedded in its social, economic, and historical context. Therefore, courses should provide for an understanding of legal rules in an interdisciplinary context.
